Course Title : Reading French Literature Core Course Credits : 4

### **Course Description**

This course will serve as an initiation to literary analysis of French texts. Students will acquire the vocabulary necessary for analyzing literature. As this course introduces important French literary traditions and movements since the French Middle Ages to the current times it will also serve as an introduction to various literary genres and their interaction with other creative media like painting, cinema etc.

#### **Course Outcome**

- Students will gain knowledge about important moments of French literary history.
- Students will have a basic understanding of the main literary genres and key French creative writers.

**Course Title : Introduction to Linguistics** 

Core Course Credits : 4

**Course Description:** The following topics will be covered in this course:

Linguistics as a science: definition, object, method.

A brief history of linguistics: traditional grammar, comparative linguistics, historical linguistics, descriptive linguistics.

The key concepts of modern linguistics, includingLangage, Langue, Parole; Indice, signal, symbol; Signe, Signifiant, Signifié; Synchronie, Diachronie; Compétence, Performance; Syntagmatique, Paradigmatique.

Introduction to different areas of linguistics analysis such as phonology, morphology and syntax. Different models of linguistics analysis, such as structural, transformational, generative, and functional.

Language and communication, including the basic theories of Mounin, Martinet, Saussure and Jakobson.

**Course outcomes:** Students will be familiarized with the nature and function of language with special reference to French. They will learn basic concepts and terminology in linguistics and to apply them to the study and analysis of French as well as other languages.
