About the University

The English and Foreign Languages University (EFLU) (formerly, the Central Institute of English and Foreign Languages [CIEFL]) was founded in 1958, and became a Central University by an Act of Parliament on 03 August 2007. The University is headquartered at Hyderabad and has two Regional Campuses—at Shillong (established in 1973) and at Lucknow (established in 1979).

The University continues to build on the achievements of the erstwhile CIEFL, and expand its activities at the national and global level. The programmes at the University are designed following the *Curricular and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes* released by UGC, according to the guidelines of the NEP, 2020. As stipulated in the document, *Curricular and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes*, page 7:

Undergraduate degree programmes of either 3 or 4-year duration, with multiple entry and exit points and re-entry options, with appropriate certifications such as:

- a UG certificate after completing 1 year (2 semesters) of study in the chosen fields of study,
- a UG diploma after 2 years (4 semesters) of study,
- a bachelor's degree after a 3-year (6 semesters) programme of study,
- a 4-year bachelor's degree (honours) after eight semesters programme of study. If the student completes a rigorous research project in their major area(s) of study in the 4th year of a bachelor's degree (honours with research).

As per the National Higher Education Qualification Framework, “After completing the requirements of a 3-year bachelor’s degree, candidates who meet a minimum 75% marks or its equivalent grade will be allowed to continue studies in the fourth year of the undergraduate programme leading to the bachelor’s degree (Honours with Research)— NHEQF, Pg37”

The University adopts the guidelines mentioned in the *Curricular and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes*, page 9, 3.2.3:

Awarding UG Certificate, UG Diploma, and Degrees

UG Certificate: Students who opt to exit after completion of the first year and have secured 40 credits will be awarded a UG certificate if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation of the first year. These students are allowed to re-enter the degree programme within three years and complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

UG Diploma: Students who opt to exit after completion of the second year and have secured 80 credits will be awarded the UG diploma if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation of the second year. These students are allowed to re-enter within a period of three years and complete the degree programme within the maximum period of seven years. 3-year

UG Degree: Students who wish to undergo a 3-year UG programme will be awarded UG Degree in the Major discipline after successful completion of three years, securing 120 credits and satisfying the minimum credit requirement as given in table 2 (Section 5).

4-year UG Degree (Honours): A four-year UG Honours degree in the major discipline will be awarded to those who complete a four-year degree programme with 160 credits and have satisfied the credit requirements as given in table 2 in Section 5.

4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research): Students who secure 75% marks and above in the first six semesters and wish to undertake research at the undergraduate level can choose a research stream in the fourth year. They should do a research project or dissertation under the guidance of a faculty member of the University/College. The research project/dissertation will be in the major discipline. The students who secure 160 credits, including 12 credits from a research project/dissertation, are awarded UG Degree (Honours with Research).

All undergraduate programmes at the University aim to fulfil the above-mentioned credit requirement.

3.4 Duration of the Programme

i. The duration of the UG programme is 4 years or 8 semesters. Students who desire to undergo a 3-year UG Programme will be allowed to exit after completion of the 3rd year. If a student wants to leave after the completion of the first or second year, the student will be given a UG Certificate or UG Diploma, respectively, provided they secure the prescribed number of credits. Students who exit with a UG certificate or UG diploma are permitted to re-enter within three years and complete the degree programme.

ii. Students may be permitted to take a break from the study during the period of study but the total duration for completing the programme shall not exceed 7 years.

These exit points are pertinent for the next level of study. The Master's Degree of two/one years, depending on three/four years of Bachelor's Degree, respectively.

B.A. (Honours/Honours with Research) Programmes in Foreign Languages

The 4-Year BA (Honours/Honours with Research) are offered in Arabic, Japanese, Korean, Persian, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Russian, and Spanish. These programmes teach various aspects of these languages – oral and written expression, reading and listening comprehension, use of the foreign language for academic purposes, and also provide opportunities for learners to use the language concerned in interpersonal as well as business contexts. Students are trained for jobs in the tourism and hospitality industry, translation services, digital content creation, etc.

As outlined by the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the programmes have four exit options. Students exiting the Programme after one year (2 semesters) will receive a UG Certificate, at the 2 years (4 semesters) a UG Diploma, and after 3 years (6 semesters), a BA degree. Students who wish to continue the Programme into the fourth year can opt for a BA (Honours) or BA (Honours with Research) degree after completing 8 semesters.

Evaluation

The performance of a student on a programme will be on the basis of (i) continuous assessments, and (ii) semester-end examinations.

The ratio of continuous assessment to semester-end examinations will be 40:60 or 50:50.

Continuous assessment may comprise class tests, assignments, presentations, or response papers. There will be a minimum of three continuous assessment tests. The best two of three will be considered for the final grade. *Semester-end assessment* shall be in the form of a sit-down examination only.

Grading System

As per the UGC Curricular Framework for Undergraduate Programmes, implementation of NEP 2020 10-point grade scale, the grade points (GP), the range of marks and the range of Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) shall be determined as given in the table below:

Detailed distribution and break-up of the Comprehensive Continuous Assessment (CCA) shall be specified by the teacher concerned in the detailed Course outline for each course taught by him/her during a semester.

Promotion to the next semester

Students who accumulate a backlog of more than two courses/papers at any point will have to exit from the programme.

The maximum permissible period for clearing backlog of a courses is as under:

In all the above cases ex-students shall cease to be eligible for hostel accommodation, stipend, book allowance and library facilities beyond their regular stipulated period of admission to the programme.

Promotion to the next Semester, Credit transfer, Credit Accrual and Credit Redemption

1. For promotion to the next semester, a student should not have a backlog of more than two courses at any given semester.
2. Students can obtain a certificate, diploma, or a degree from the University after the successful completion of each semester of a programme that they have enrolled for. The qualification (UG Certificate/ UG Diploma/Degree/Degree with

Hons./Degree Hons. with research) will depend on the number of semesters they have successfully completed, when they choose to exit the programme.

3. The EFL University offers students the facility to bank your credits. The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC), linked to the National Academic Depository (NAD), where the academic and other data of students are stored, enables students to register or commence credit transfer. However, the University is responsible for the final outcomes of credit redemption and issuance of certificates, as well as the compilation of award records. These will be administered via the NAD Platform.
4. Credits earned and deposited with ABC shall be valid for the purpose of redemption to a degree or diploma or Post Graduate diploma or certificate, to a maximum duration of seven years.

(The University Grants Commission (Establishment and Operation of Academic Bank of Credits in Higher Education) Regulation, 2021)

Supplementary/Grade Improvement Examination

Students who obtain grade B or below and are desirous of improving their grades in any course may take a Grade Improvement/ Repeat Examination.

Supplementary examinations shall serve as repeat examinations. Supplementary examinations shall be scheduled around the second or third week of January (for Semesters II, IV, VI, and VIII) and July (for Semesters I, III, IV and VII) in Hyderabad and Lucknow and in the last week of February (for Semesters II, IV, VI and VIII) and in the second and third week of June (for Semesters I, III, V and VII) in Shillong.

Only those students who fulfil the attendance, disciplinary, and academic requirements of the programme shall be allowed to exercise the option of Supplementary/Grade Improvement/Repeat examination.

Students are required to apply to the Controller of Examinations through the Chairperson, BoS, concerned within seven days of commencement of the following semester or declaration of results whichever is later for Grade Improvement/Repeat examination paying a fee of Rs.120/- subject to revision from time to time for each paper.

Guidelines for Writing the Dissertation

Students who wish to graduate with a B.A. *Honours with Research* degree are required to write a dissertation on a research topic of their choice, under the supervision of a faculty member. The dissertation is for 12 credits and intends to help students to conduct an independent research. The topic chosen should be from the domain that the student wishes to major in, for instance, linguistics, English language education, literature. The dissertation could involve some level of theorization, a replication of a study, an exploratory research, or an experimental study. The dissertation needs to be completed within a semester, hence a topic needs to be chosen accordingly.

The dissertation needs to be supervised by a member of the faculty employed at the University. Students need to choose a supervisor based on the topic of their choice and the teacher's willingness to guide the student. A completed dissertation form with a tentative title has to be submitted in the Office of the Controller of Examinations by the deadline mentioned during course registration.

Since the dissertation is equivalent to a taught course on the programme, students have to meet their supervisors for at least 4 hours every week of the semester. The attendance sheet, duly signed by the Supervisor, has to be submitted at the end of every month in the Office of the Controller of Examinations (attendance sheets are available in the Office of the Controller of Examinations). It is therefore recommended that the student meet the supervisor on a regular basis.

Guidelines for submission of the dissertation

Sections of the Dissertation: The length of the dissertation is 10,000 – 12,000 words, approximately 40-50 printed pages. The Dissertation should have the following parts/sections:

Title, Declaration, Certification, Abstract, Table of Contents, Chapters, Acknowledgement, Appendices, List of References and Bibliography.

For referencing conventions, use either the MLA style sheet, Chicago Manual, or the APA style sheet as used by the discipline in which the dissertation is submitted.

Plagiarism clearance: The dissertation should be checked for plagiarism by the Supervisor before submission on Turnitin. All sources cited in the body of the dissertation must be acknowledged. Once the dissertation is ready for submission, a soft copy of the dissertation has to be submitted to the Supervisor for the plagiarism check. The University allows a maximum of a similarity index of 10% for dissertation to be submitted. An index equal to or above 10% needs to be reworked before submission.

Submission and evaluation: Two hard-bound copies of the dissertation duly plagiarism checked by the Supervisor needs to be submitted in the Office of the Controller of Examinations. The dissertation will be evaluated by the Supervisor and one external examiner, chosen by the department concerned, who is familiar with the area of work. A final grade arrived at by the two examiners will be submitted in the Office of the Controller of Examinations.

Guidelines for formatting the dissertation

The dissertation to be submitted should be typed in Times New Roman, 12 font size with 1.5 line spacing. The paper size is A4, with 1.5 inches left margin, and 1 inches on right, top and bottom. All pages should be numbered, except the Title page, Table of contents, Dedication, Certification and Acknowledgements. Printing should be one side.

Rules and Regulations

Attendance requirement

Students are required to attend all lectures, tutorials, language laboratory sessions, etc. A student shall be deemed to have pursued a regular course of study provided that he/she has attended at least 75% of the classes held in each course and has completed all class/periodical/continuous assessment/sessional tests, assignments, and practicals as prescribed by the School(s)/Department(s)/Programme Committee(s) concerned.

Please note as per university rules:

Students who do not fulfil the attendance requirement are not eligible to appear for the semester-end examination.

Relaxation in attendance

- i. The 75% attendance requirement may be relaxed by 5% for those who participate in extra-curricular activities with the **prior permission** of the authorities concerned.
- ii. The 75% attendance requirement may be relaxed by 5% on medical grounds.
- iii. Further to these concessions, the Vice-Chancellor, on the recommendation of the Dean(s)/Head(s) of the Department(s)/Programme Coordinator(s), Dean, Academics and Dean, DSW or the campus Director (as the case may be) may condone the shortage in attendance not exceeding 10% for valid and convincing reasons.
- iv. Absence due to authorized participation in sports activities (at national, state and university levels) will not be treated as a shortfall in attendance.

Notwithstanding any of the above, the attendance requirement may not in any case be relaxed below 60%.

Rules of Discipline and Proper Conduct

The rules listed here shall apply to all students of the University under Article 29 of the Statutes of the EFL University. Any breach of discipline and conduct committed by a student inside or outside the EFL University Campus shall fall under the purview of these rules.

Categories of misconduct and indiscipline

- All acts of violence and forms of coercion such as gheraos, dharnas, sit-ins which disrupt the normal academic and administrative functioning of the University
- Sexual harassment
- Committing forgery, defacing/destroying/damaging books/journals of the library, etc.
- Furnishing false certificates or false information
- Eve-teasing or disrespectful behaviour with a girl student
- Arousing communal, caste or regional feelings or disharmony among students
- Use of abusive, defamatory, derogatory language
- Pasting of posters of an objectionable nature

- Unauthorized occupation of the hostel room/s
- Indulging in acts of gambling
- Use of the title of the University when distributing any document other than academic work outside the University
- Consuming or possessing dangerous drugs
- Non-payment of fees and other dues including mess charges
- Ragging in any form
- Refusal to obey the directions of the officers of the University
- Unauthorized collection of funds for any student's programme
- Any other act which may be considered by the Competent Authority as a violation of discipline, or misconduct

Punishments

The Competent Authority may impose punishment on any student found guilty of any of the acts of indiscipline or misconduct mentioned above.

Removal of Student from the Course/Programme: The Dean of the School/Proctor / Dean, Student's Welfare / Dean, Research may recommend to the Vice Chancellor the removal of a student from a Programme/Course on the basis of unsatisfactory academic performance and / or misconduct (as defined in the Regulations) / or non-payment of fees on time.

Support Systems at work

Anti-Ragging Committee

Any form of ragging within the premises of the EFL University will be viewed seriously and dealt with swiftly and severely by the Administration (vide Ordinance 6.2, entitled "Prohibition of and Punishment for Ragging," of the English and Foreign Languages University.) Anti-ragging squads and an Anti-Ragging Committee will be empowered to take *suo moto* action or upon receiving a complaint. As per the directions of the Supreme Court of India, "if any incident of ragging comes to the notice of the authority, the concerned student shall be given liberty to explain and if his/her explanation is not found satisfactory, the authority would expel him from the University."

Anti-Sexual Harassment and Redressal Mechanism

The EFL University has evolved a policy against sexual harassment to create for women students on its Campuses a gender-just and secure environment (vide Ordinance 7.2, Annexure-I, entitled "Sexual Harassment", of the English and Foreign Languages University). Every Campus of the EFL University has a Complaints Committee, with representatives from all sections of the University, to address the complaints of women students and staff. The names, addresses and phone numbers of the members of University Complaints Committee (UCC) are displayed at all prominent places in the Campus. Complaints will be kept confidential and the Committee has the power to recommend any action(s) against the perpetrators. The Committee also takes upon itself the task of organizing various gender sensitization programmes. There is also an Appellate Committee to consider problems when the Complaints Committee's decisions are not found satisfactory.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism

All grievances within the University will be resolved through discussions and negotiations and through a Grievance-Redressal mechanism. The following are some of these:

- **Grievances with regard to the Hostels** may be referred to the Provost/Warden concerned
- **Individual grievances** may be referred to teachers in each Department who will be appointed staff advisers.
- **Group grievances** may be resolved within the Department.
- **Miscellaneous grievances** pertaining to Library/Finance/Sports, etc. will be resolved by the Committee concerned.
- **Academic grievances of students:** Students aggrieved due to the grade awarded in a course may apply in a prescribed form along with a fee of Rs. 100/- for each course to the Head of the Department giving reasons for his/her feeling aggrieved within one month of the notification of the results. A Committee will examine the case and the grade awarded by the Committee upon review will be final. All grievances should be submitted to the appropriate body within two weeks after the event at issue.
