Course description	<p>i. A brief overview of the course - This course introduces students to the foundational concepts, categories, and methodologies of literary theory. It covers the classification of literary genres (epic, lyric, dramatic, and lyrical-epic), elements of narrative structure, stylistic and poetic devices, and the components of artistic expression. Emphasis is placed on understanding key theoretical constructs such as <i>artistic image</i>, <i>chronotope</i>, <i>authorial voice</i>, <i>theme</i>, <i>idea</i>, <i>plot</i>, <i>conflict</i>, and <i>composition</i>. Through detailed study of terms like <i>symbol</i>, <i>subtext</i>, <i>psychologism</i>, <i>grotesque</i>, and <i>comic/tragic</i>, the course equips students to analyze literary works critically and systematically across genres and historical contexts.</p> <p>ii. Course description	<p>i. A brief overview of the course - This course explores the formative periods of Russian literature from the 10th to the 18th century, tracing the evolution of literary forms, genres, and themes across diverse historical epochs. Beginning with the literature of Kievan Rus, it covers key chronicles, heroic epics, religious writings, and travelogues, moving into the literary developments of Muscovite Russia and the transformative Enlightenment period under Peter the Great.</p>

	<p>The course concludes with an examination of Russian Classicism, Sentimentalism, and the rise of Enlightenment realism. Through selected readings, students gain deep insights into the ideological, spiritual, and stylistic shifts that shaped Russian literary tradition.</p> <p>ii.
