

MA Comparative Literature

a. Brief Description of the Programme

The MA in Comparative Literature is a dynamic, interdisciplinary postgraduate programme designed to meet the evolving requirements of literary studies and allied disciplines in Indian universities. With rubrics aligned to national standards, the programme empowers students to develop an interdisciplinary outlook and engage critically with texts across languages, genres, and cultures. Integrating approaches from Comparative Literature, English Literature, Indian Literature and Aesthetics, Art History, and South Asian Studies, the curriculum not only prepares students for advanced academic research and diverse professional careers, but also enables eligibility for NET examinations in Comparative Literature, English Literature, Indian Culture, and related areas. Graduates emerge equipped for higher studies, teaching, and research in a wide range of humanities and cultural fields.
